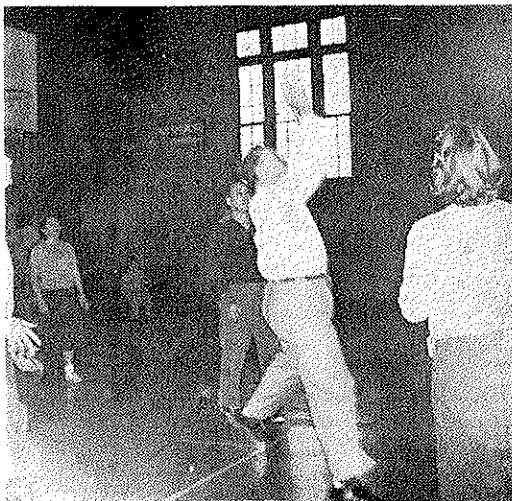

Opening the season for Piedmont was a game with Harding. Harding scored in the second quarter and failed to make an extra point. They kept their lead throughout the game until the 4th quarter when Donny Hartsell broke loose for a touchdown, his first of the year, and tied the score. Their extra point was missed also and with about 3 minutes left to play Piedmont however held Harding and walked off the field with a 6 to 6 tie.

In the A. G. game however, A. G. held a commanding lead the whole game making T. D.'s in the 2nd and 4th quarters. This was the second time in 15 years Piedmont was beaten by A. G. A. G. broke Piedmont's record, 8 straight wins, with a 13 to 0 victory. Defeat was still not over Piedmont for in the Myers Park game Myers Park scored in 2nd and 3rd quarters to hold a lead throughout the whole game. Piedmont did however come back in the last minutes of the game with a score by a pass from quarterback Clinton Lindley to end Vickie Moser. This was one score, however, and was not enough to stop the Mustangs. This was Piedmont's 2nd defeat of the season.

In October Coach Buckholz left Piedmont when he heard the announcement that his father had died suddenly in Orange, Conn. While Mr. Buckholz was gone Bob Miller took over coaching the team and he must have done a pretty good job for he lead Piedmont to their first victory of the year over

Tech a 25 to 0 game. In this game Hartsell scored 3 times and Lindley once.

Piedmont met Harding next for the second time. In the game Piedmont led all the way through the game with their first touchdowns scored by Donny Hartsell in the second period. In the last period Clinton Lindley galloped 87 yards on a punt return for a T. D. In the last quarter Harding made a touchdown also but it was not enough to stop the Panthers who walked off the field with a 13 to 6 victory. This victory took Harding out of the race for the city championship.

Our next game was with A. G. Both teams showed a marvelous defensive game for Piedmont held A. G. twice on their own footline. This game was scoreless until in the last quarter when Vickie Moser set up a touchdown by catching apass on the five yard line. On 3rd down Donny Hartsell scored the only touchdown of the game with 3 minutes of the game left. Although A. G. tried hard to score they couldn't quite do it. This loss also took them out of the race for city championship. The final score was Piedmont 6, A. G. no-pointing.

Piedmont had a game scheduled with Tech but it was never played for Tech forfeited the game to Piedmont because of difficulty beyond their control. The '53 season gave Piedmont a number of 4 games won, 2 lost, and 1 tied but this was said to not have been as good a schedule as Myers Park had so they took the city title.

The Panthers roared back by downing A. G. in the preliminary game at Central's gym. The Panther quint poured in 48 points to A. G.'s 44. Allen was again high with 15 points. Rion was high for the Bulldogs with 16.

Piedmont kept in the win column by downing O'Donoghue by 41 to 21. Melvin Dixon played his way into the high scores berth with 11 points. Bernie Balas collected 7 for the visitors. In the second game with Piedmont Balas found the range for 16 points and paced O'Donoghue to a 36 to 34 victory. Melvin Dixon stayed in the high scorers berth by racking up 11 points.

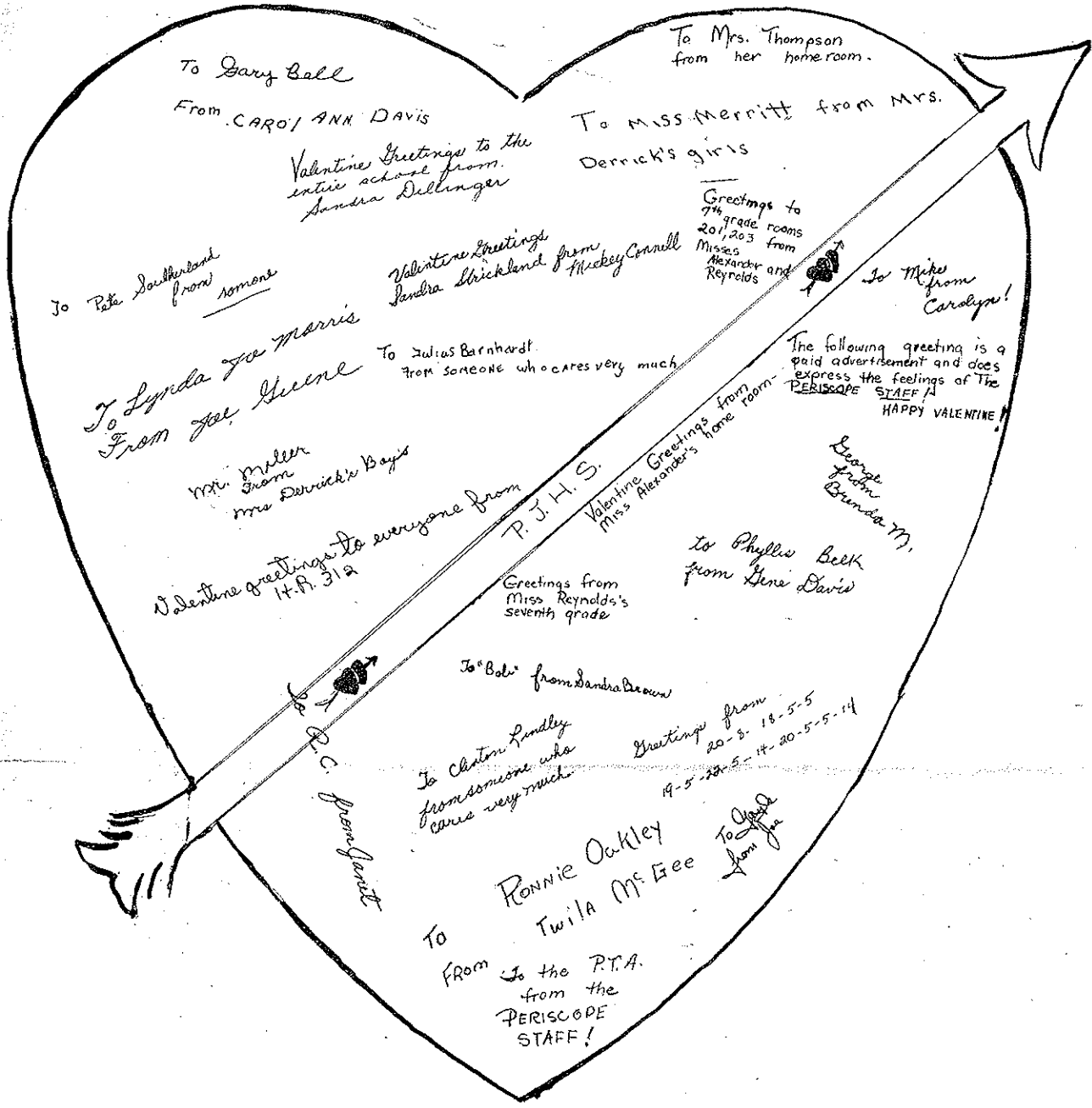
